This month, our Office Administrators daughter, Leah Germing, investigated the history of concrete and wrote an article for us.

The History of Concrete By Leah Germing

Concrete like structures were built by the Nabataea traders or Bedouins who occupied and controlled a series of oases and developed a small empire in the regions of Southern Syria and Northern Jordan in around 6500BC.

In 3000BC the Ancient Egyptians used mud mixed with straw to form bricks. They also used gypsum and lime mortars in building the pyramids. In the Ancient Egyptian and later Roman eras, builders discovered that adding volcanic ash to the mix allowed it to set underwater!

After the fall of the Roman Empire in 476AD, the technique for making cement was lost until the discovery of manuscripts describing it was found in 1414. People then became interested in using concrete again.

The Concrete we use today was made in 1824 by a man named Joseph Aspdin. He patented the first true artificial cement, which he called Portland Cement. The name implied that it was of the same high quality as Portland stone.

Concrete has now been used to build the biggest structures in the world!




